

CULTIVATING A SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITY

"A sustainable community manages its human, natural and financial capital to meet current needs while ensuring that adequate resources are available for future generations," according to the Institute for Sustainable Communities. This focus at the City of Tallahassee is driving changes in policy, operations, community-building and more.

For example, in 2021, the City adopted a Green Building policy that established energy-efficient, sustainable and healthy building standards for City-owned building renovation and new construction projects. This policy was quickly implemented with positive results. During demolition of the former Northwood Centre last year, 83.35 percent of materials were recycled.

Greening the City's fleet is another major initiative. In line with the City's five-year strategic plan, 30 percent of StarMetro's fleet has transitioned to electric, with the goal of reaching an all-electric bus fleet by 2035. The City is also actively transitioning light-duty vehicles to electric. Actions to reach these goals, matched with adherence to professional best practices for environmental standards, paved the way for the City's Fleet department to attain the Government Green Fleet Award as the top-ranked city in the Southeast and 15th in the nation.

Cultivating a sustainable community requires holistic effort. As such, the City began development in 2019 of a Clean Energy Plan to help chart a path for the community to reach a 100 percent net clean, renewable energy future. Following multi-year community engagement, analysis and planning efforts, the Clean Energy Plan is nearing completion.

These broad efforts are only part of the puzzle. Below are five actions you can implement to reduce your impact on our environment and conserve natural resources.

- Insulate your home. This includes having adequate ceiling insulation, as well as sealing gaps around windows and doors.
- Repair water leaks quickly. A hot water leak is especially important to fix as it also wastes energy.
- Set your thermostat wisely. The smaller the difference between the outdoor and indoor temperature, the less your cooling/heating system needs to work.
- Divert waste from the landfill by composting food scraps; recycling paper, plastic, glass and metal; and donating, repurposing or re-homing gently used items.
- Walk, bike, carpool or use public transportation whenever possible.
